PIPPA SMALL ROYAL JEWELRY-WITH HEART!

The ethical designer supports traditional artisans-and has found fans in both Meghan and Kate by MONIQUE JESSEN

ippa Small has been a pioneer of ethical jewelry-meaning her work follows transparent and

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responsible sourcing practices and uses sustainable materials like recvcled metals and crystal quartz-for 25 years. But she says her message wouldn't have reached the masses without key ambassadors: the rovals. In Canada in 2016, Princess Kate wore a pair of Small's earrings, and overnight sales soared. "It was one of those slightly life-changing moments," says the London-based designer, who works with local artisans in war-torn Afghanistan and Myanmar as well as refugees in Bolivia and Jordan. In 2018 she wrote to Meghan, Duchess of Sussex, to detail her outreach with nonprofits such as Turquoise Mountain, founded by Prince Charles. Since then, Meghan has worn Small's designs to Princess Eugenie's wedding and for her interview with Oprah Winfrey. The duchess "is bringing the concept of ethical jewelry to a different audience," says Small. "It's just fantastic."

Kate's earrings were "inspired by the kite festivals in Afghanistan," says the jeweler, who was awarded an MBE by the Queen in 2013.

Small says Meghan's choice of the "Colette" necklace for her March 2021 interview with Winfrey, which she previously wore on a 2018 royal tour with a stop in Tonga (right) held layers of meaning. "Aquamarine is a calming stone-the ancient Greeks believed it was a protective amulet," says the jeweler. "And I saw the three stones as the [Sussexes'] family unit." Sales of the \$2,145 necklace promptly quadrupled. "I think that interview resonated with young women. She's a role model for so many."
